The Alpha Beta State Chapter of DKG will be holding the State Convention on April 21 to April 23 in Solomons Island, MD. During the state convention, members will be voting on proposed amendments to the ABS Bylaws and Standing Rules.

Joan Wiggins, in a recent e-mail to Chapter Presidents, asked members to review the current ABS Bylaws and Standing Rules and submit suggested amendments to her as soon as possible so they can be sent to the Bylaws and Standing Rules Committee. Any ABS member, committee, chapter, or board may submit for consideration proposals for amendments to the Bylaws and Standing Rules Committee. The Executive Committee will review the proposed amendments before approval by the president for publishing. Guidelines for amending ABS Bylaws and Standing Rules are as follows.

**By Laws** – "The Bylaws of Alpha Beta State may be amended at the state convention in the odd-numbered year by two-thirds (2/3) vote, provided notice of proposed amendments shall have been published at least 60 days before convening the convention. Proposed amendments shall be mailed to Alpha Beta State members no later than the February issue of the Alpha Beta State NEWS (Current Bylaws, Article XI Section A)."

**Standing Rules** – "The Standing Rules of Alpha Beta State may be amended or rescinded at the state convention (odd-numbered year) by a majority vote with notice, or by twothirds (2/3) vote without prior notice. Published proposed amendments shall be mailed to Alpha Beta State members no later than the February issue of the Alpha Beta State NEWS (Current Standing Rules, Article XI Section B).

### Don't Wait Too Long to Apply for Scholarships

This year I was grateful and honored to be chosen to receive a state scholarship from Delta Kappa Gamma. I had learned of the DKG scholarship program from attending our local Alpha Alpha chapter meetings. I started pursuing my doctorate interests at a slow speed in the fall of 2012 with one course, unsure if I could indeed complete this endeavor. After taking a few classes to "whet" my appetite I dove into the full process of residency at West Virginia University and completed 60 credits before applying for the DKG scholarships. I am currently accepted in the doctoral program in Curriculum and Instruction with a focus on multiculturalism at WVU.

With this scholarship, I was able to relieve the financial stress that pursuing an advanced degree can encompass. At the moment I am writing this article, and with the help of this scholarship and the support of DKG, I have completed my comprehensive examinations and I am currently working on the prospectus for my dissertation. I actually completed my final core coursework this past summer, which included, in part, co-teaching two courses with the chairperson of my committee. The final part of my summer was spent in the completion of the comprehensive exams mentioned prior and has led to my prospectus writing of the first chapters of my dissertation. My current area of focus is rural Appalachia schools and minority populations focusing on the transnationally adopted Asians within this community.

I am not sure why I waited so long to apply for the scholarship opportunities from Delta Kappa Gamma. The process was simple and all the members I contacted in regard to the scholarship programs were both cordial and extremely helpful. I would encourage members of the Maryland chapters of DKG to pursue these opportunities that our sisterhood has availed to us. It has certainly made both a monetary impact for me but also, knowing and feeling the support of others through out Maryland, a very personal impact.

Each state was given a specific responsibility in putting this event together. The committee felt that Delaware was the perfect location for the event and they researched venues for the Arts Retreat. As we planned, the subject of funding for the arts retreat was an issue that we needed to tackle. We didn't want the participants to pay for any materials for their workshop. Their registration would include only their meals. We also agreed that each state organization would not use any funds from their budgets for this project. Joan notified the past Northeast Regional Director, Dr. Kay Clawson and the past International President, Dr. Lyn Schmid of our plans and asked for suggestions for funding sources. They recommended that we apply for the Lucile Cornetet Seminar Professional Development Award. The committee knew that the deadline was approaching and we worked feverously to complete the application. Once we were awarded the funds, the intense planning took place.

On October 1, 84 DKG members and non-members assembled at Centennial United Methodist Church in Smyrna Delaware for our Arts Retreat/Seminar. We renamed it the Arts Seminar to reflect the wording of the funding from the Lucile Cornetet award. We had 13 workshops offered for the attendees. The workshops were: Book clubs, cake decorating, card making, choral singing & music theory, culinary sweets, dance, fall craft, finger painting, genealogy, mosaics, nature's angels, poetry and soulful harvest (memoir writing). With the exception of one instructor, all the presenters were DKG sisters. From Maryland, the presenters were Christine Redman, Nu; Sally Clark, Nu; Carol Miller-Schultz, Pi; Wendy Happel, Mu and Joan Wiggins, Alpha Theta. There were a few glitches during the day including having a workshop relocated because the original room was locked.



Christine Redman led a workshop on creating mosaics. She came prepared with frames, cut glass, tile pieces, and grout for this creative activity. It was messy, but fun!

During the workshops, the Fellowship Hall was filled with crafts, foods, family trees and writings. Dancing and singing were held in other rooms. We were all pleased that the past International President, Dr. Lyn Schmid attended and met many new sisters in our states. By the end of the day, all participants had a bag filled with their projects or papers. The committee presented the instructors with an award. The committee received medals and the participants all received certificates. The evaluations were reviewed and everyone unanimously enjoyed the day and would like to attend another event similar to this in the future. They remarked that it was a bit crowded in the Fellowship Hall and difficult at times to hear the instructor. Overall, the day was a success and the committee is planning to present a breakout session at the 2017 Northeast Regional Conference in Windsor, Ontario about planning a Joint Arts Seminar.

# **Society Workshop**

The Alpha Beta State Society Workshop was one that I am sure many will not forget. Thanks to *Amanda Ensor* of Nu chapter, we were very fortunate to have her aunt, *Ellie von Wellsheim* share with us **The MoonCatcher Project**.



Ellie is the founder of this project. Even though we had technological difficulties during the presentation, I think we all realized how fortunate we are to have so many resources available to us. Who would have thought that a monthly period can still stop girls from coming to school? And yet there are still areas in the world where girls have no access to feminine hygiene products, which impacts their school attendance. The MoonCatcher Project provides washable, reusable menstrual pads that can be worn without underwear. These are given in the form of kits placed together in a small bag. These kits make it possible for these girls to come to school even during their periods. Being able to go to school regularly gives these girls a better chance of succeeding in school and so their lives are improved. Girls who finish school marry later, have fewer children, and are able to help themselves and their families financially.

During one of the breakout sessions, many sisters had the opportunity to help make these "mooncatcher" kits. They worked on various aspects of constructing these pads with directions given by Ellie and her sister, Trish Rhodes. Some participants sewed, some cut, some folded, and some ironed. Everyone worked very diligently on this project.


