Maryland DKG Members Attend International Training in Texas

This past June, *Weezie Carey*, Alpha Delta; *Sharon Darling*, Nu; *Janey Snyder*, Alpha; and *Sally Nazelrod*, Xi, represented Maryland at a DKG International weekend training session in Irving, Texas. Throughout the weekend, members attended a specific training for their office or committee chair position. (Weezie – Treasurer, Sharon – Membership Committee, Janey – Educational Excellence, Sally – President). All of the professional development learning and activities were presented to highlight current successful practices and reinforce traditions and protocols in these specific areas of the society.

One of the activities that was presented was a goal-setting template entitled "Teach to Lead." Most of the states selected some facet of membership recruitment and/or retention. In Maryland, our group of four members went through the process using the template to identify a Problem of Practice – Recruiting New Members – and discussed possible Root Causes, a Theory of Action, Inputs, Actions, Outputs, and Outcomes. Membership is a focus throughout our society and in Maryland, due to an overall decrease in membership.

The training provided opportunities for the attendees to network and share ideas with leaders from other states and countries.

2023 International Conference in Detroit

There were several sessions that stressed servant leadership and positive member engagement. Self-care for members was a focus of one of the keynote speakers who reviewed all of the components of wellness: mental, physical, emotional, social, intellectual, environmental, spiritual, financial, occupational. All of these dimensions affect our lives every day, and the audience members were encouraged to take the time to make positive changes for better health. Yoga and meditation were promoted to relieve tension and stress. Other sessions included journaling, financial planning, dealing with students who have experienced trauma, and membership promotion. The International staff continued to report membership losses throughout the society and encouraged all participants to make a conscientious effort to brainstorm strategies to increase membership. Throughout the conference, there were many opportunities to socialize, share ideas, and have fun.

Out of Slavery - Session Review

The author, Carol *Trembath*, shared the adventures, hardships, and successes of Harriet's life in her book, Out of Slavery. I always knew that Harriet Tubman was a brave and courageous conductor on the underground railroad. However, this book, as told by Harriet's friends, shares her life as a Union spy during the Civil War and her experiences in the South when the fighting was at its worst. Harriet eventually settled in upstate New York. She continued to advocate for equality and often found herself conversations with other famous Americans such as Frederick Douglass, Susan B. Anthony, Harriet Beecher Stowe, and William H. Seward. kindness and braverv continued throughout her entire life as she helped the unfortunate. She was an amazing woman with a huge, loving heart.

Laughter Workshop - Session Review

One of the highlights for me at the conference in Detroit was attending a workshop led by *Edna Thayer* (age 87) entitled "Lighten Up Through Laughter" or "Humor for the Health of It." Most of her material came from a book which she co-authored with Mary Huntley in 2007 entitled *A Mirthful Spirit: Embracing Laughter for Wellness*. The book says, "Mirth is the emotional response to humor; laughter is the physical response. Mirth is joy."

Mrs. Thayer kept the group in stitches during her entire presentation. She is trying to fulfill a goal of making a presentation in each of the 50 states, and she has only a few more to go. Mrs. Thayer says that we need to "recognize that laughter is beneficial, intentionally seek opportunities to laugh, and turn negative situations into positive ones." She says that laughter "alleviates pain, lightens stress, tickles the funny bone, and yields healthful rewards."

With children, Mrs. Thayer says to find ways to "prevent negative teasing by creating opportunities to do good, help children to help themselves, give hugs and smiles, and apply zero-tolerance rules in a thoughtful manner." Laughter increases alertness, creativity, short-term memory, and the ability to problem solve.

These are just a few of the ideas from her book. Mrs. Thayer is hoping to be at the International Convention next summer, so be sure to include her workshop on your list of must attends at National Harbor in the summer of 2024.

What is EEC?

I guess that many think as I do that the Educational Excellence Committee (EEC) plans the program for meetings on the state, chapter, and international levels. Well, you are not wrong, but program planning is only a small piece of the picture.

The International EEC is using the term "Umbrella of EEC" as their theme for this biennium. So what is under this umbrella? Some other items listed (but not limited to this list) are: Supporting Early Career Education, The Arts, Legislation, Professional Development, and Program and Chapter Projects, some of which are discussed below.

UN/CTAUN or Committee on Teaching about the United Nations (New York Conferences at the UN Headquarters) provides resources for use in the classroom. For more information about Teach the UN, check the website: dgc-teachtheun@un.org . Unfortunately, the UN has not scheduled any recent or upcoming conferences, only webinars, Professional Development, and The Arts.

Another project from EEC is the Schools for Africa Project, which donates to the Global Education Fund Pool from the UN. This project supports schools in need worldwide, a recent change by the UN. In the past, these funds were designated for Africa only.

The US Forum of DKG will sponsor the National Legislative Seminar, March 10-13, 2024, in Washington, D.C. The National Legislative Seminar (NLS) is a great opportunity for DKG members to learn about our government, and we are lucky to be close to the seminar. This year's resolution from the US Forum is to concentrate on Mental Health for Educators. This seminar will offer opportunities to learn advocacy skills, network with other DKG members, discuss important issues, listen to informative speakers, and participate in historic tours. 


Pi Chapter's Picks Summer Reads

Tau Chapter's school partner for the coming year will be Darlington Elementary. The school is located in the community of Darlington, which is in the northeast corner of Harford County near the Susquehanna River. It is the smallest school in Harford County. The principal is Ms. Alberta Porter, and the assistant principal is Ms. Danielle O'Neill. There are approximately 120 students in grades K - 5 and both a primary and intermediate Autism Regional Program. These classes are known as S.T.R.I.V.E - Structured Teaching with Reinforcement in a Visual Environment. Since this is a smaller school, the members of Tau Chapter hope to be able to do more to support the faculty and staff. When Ms. Porter agreed to be their school partner, she immediately sent a list of necessary school supplies. She noted that the school tries to keep their family supply lists reasonable. The Darlington Wish List includes multi-colored 3x3 Post-It notes, dry erase markers, multicolored or black Crayola markers, baby and/or Clorox wipes, glue sticks, glue, and loose leaf notebook paper. These supplies will be collected at the Tau Chapter meeting on September 19th.

Mu Members Making Glass at McFadden

Have you ever wondered what it feels like to stand in front of a glory hole, a small opening in a furnace that runs 24/7 and reaches temperatures over 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit? Well, eight ladies from Mu Chapter know how it feels to work in front of one! On Saturday, April 29, 2023, they traveled to McFadden Art Glass to try their hands at making their own glass blown creation.

McFadden Art Glass is a custom glassblowing studio and art gallery in Baltimore, Maryland. Mu member *Wendy Happel* arranged a fascinating field trip that included a glass blowing demonstration and one-on-one instruction with a professional. The demonstration introduced members to the equipment and procedure for blowing glass. Members utilized all parts of the hot shop, including the various tools, furnaces, and marver (a steel table to roll glass). The instructors provided guidance along the way and blew into the steel rod to help expertly shape the glass.

The glass blowing tutorial began by choosing a project and up to three colors of glass to include in it. Choosing the colors they wanted for their masterpiece proved to be the most challenging part of the experience. Projects included wine glasses, ornaments, bowls, and starfish. Once the hard part was done, the fun began. Instructors assisted members throughout the entire process from collecting clear glass in the glory hole, to adding the colors, melting them in the glory hole, blowing and shaping the creation using the tools and marver, cutting the glass, and finally placing the creation into the annealer to allow it to cool for two days.

After the projects were made, members toured the gallery which was abounding with beauty. One of the highlights was the intricate and multi-leveled flowered sink made out of glass. Several members purchased pieces made by the staff at McFadden Art Glass.

This amazing experience is perfect for any group. McFadden Art Glass also has special holiday projects, such as pumpkins and snowmen. Perhaps the Mu ladies have a future field trip opportunity on the horizon.
