This past summer, DKG International provided two different options to attend the International Conference in San Antonio, Texas, as well as the Leadership Training and Retreat held in Atlanta, Georgia. The conference in San Antonio, July 22 - 24, was held both in-person and virtually, accessible through the DKG International App, while the leadership training could be attended in-person and through a webinar format. Because of the online format and the ability to record sessions, members could attend the workshop and training during the allotted time or view them at a later date.

#### **State Information**

June, July, and August were busy with the formation and establishment of committee chairs and members for the 2021 - 2023 biennium. The Leadership Development Committee met in June

and July to plan and organize the online committee chair training, which was conducted and well attended on August 14, 2021. The committee chairs received a hard copy of the International Bylaws and an updated electronic Committee Chair Manual.

With Highland United Methodist Church still closed to outside groups as of early August, it was decided that the September 18th Executive Board Meeting be held via Zoom. The Executive Committee successfully organized the meeting business, and the LDC committee effectively implemented the Leadership Development Moment, which focused on what chapters are doing to move forward the theme of Evolve, Rise, Flourish. The ideas captured in breakout rooms during the LD Moment were collated and emailed to chapter presidents.

In late summer and early fall, the initial plan and intent was to hold the November Society Workshop in person. Unfortunately, with the highly contagious new strain of COVID and an informal poll, it was decided, in mid-October, that more people would attend if the workshop were to be held virtually.

Our plans changed from an in-person to an online format. The Educational Excellence Committee did a fantastic job of reorganizing the agenda from in-person to online through the leadership of Sally Nazelrod. Thank you for your flexibility and efforts!

Looking ahead, the Executive Committee is planning the March 5th Executive Board Meeting, tentatively at Highland United Methodist Church, with more details coming after the New Year.

The Leadership Development Committee is also busy planning the Leadership Development Conference to

be held on May 14th. The conference will include a speaker from DKG International, a Brain Based Leadership talk and session, an Energy Bus presentation, the Presidents' Training, and the presentation of scholarships.

COVID-19 had thrown a loop into how we function personally and as an organization. Chapters are looking into ways to use a combination of in-person meetings, Zoom gatherings, outside locations in nice weather, and larger spaces such as churches and schools. As I have visited chapters this fall and into the winter season, I can see that our chapter

- accidentally closed a tab on the internet and would like to retrieve the tab, press Ctrl+Shift+T
- want to close an existing tab, when using Chrome or Firefox internet browser, press Ctrl+W
- want to close a current internet window, press Alt+F4

In many cases, updates to the Constitution or the Bylaws are warranted to implement new goals. The Executive Board is responsible for promoting these updates, including conversations with the membership leading up to voting. It has been gratifying to see chapters promoting leadership development through invitations to those women who have been named to leadership positions within the individual school systems to present their experiences at chapter meetings.

# Bylaws and Standing Rules Committee

The ByLaws and Standing Rules Committee regrets the passing of the chair and friend, **Nadine Roberts**. Nadine had an affinity for Bylaws, and we will do our best to do the work for this committee in her honor.

The purpose of Organizational Bylaws is to maintain consistency in the running of the business. Bylaws communicate the rules so disputes and conflicts can be avoided.

Standing Rules are the rules an organization uses to specify its actions under the provision of its bylaws. They set forth the procedures adopted to accomplish specific areas of work set forth in the Bylaws. Standing Rules are more flexible than bylaws and may be changed or suspended at any board meeting by a majority vote.

The Bylaws for this committee currently read:

The Bylaws/Standing Rules Committee shall receive all proposals for amending or revising the *Bylaws of DKG Maryland State Organization* and the *Standing Rules of DKG Maryland State Organization*, shall submit the proposals to the Executive Board for discussion, and shall present the proposals to the convention for vote.

Proposed changes to the *Bylaws/Standing Rules of DKG Maryland State Organization* shall be published no later than 60 days prior to the DKG Maryland State Convention.

DKG Members are therefore asked that all proposals for changes to the DKG Maryland Bylaws and Standing Rules be submitted to Mary Makinen, acting chair, by November 2022. This will allow time for the proposals to be reviewed by the Executive Committee and presented to the membership within the 60-day period prior to the 2023 DKG Maryland State Convention.

The Bylaws and Standing Rules Committee members are: *Mary Makinen*, Alpha Delta, acting Chair; *Brenda Patterson*, Tau; *Dr. Marilyn Keane*, Upsilon; and *Gwen Cooley*, Delta.

Fran was a lecturer at the University of Wisconsin-Lacrosse for four years and lecturer at the University of Colorado for three years. Then it was off to Maryland where Fran spent 18 years at Towson University, retiring in 2019 and returning to Canada.

Fran was a member of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International since 1991. She transferred to Alpha Chapter after her move to Maryland. She presented several workshops at DKG international conventions and conferences. Fran attended the 2018 Delta Kappa Gamma Convention in Austin, Texas, where she presented a workshop explaining her work with Baltimore City inner city middle schoolers being mentored by her undergraduate students from Towson University. In addition, DKG publications included several articles by Fran. She also made some major contributions as a member of Alpha Chapter, such as organizing a clothing drive for Dress for Success. Over the years, she served as chapter parliamentarian and chaired the Alpha Chapter High School Award Committee.

Nadine Roberts graduated from Frostburg State Teachers College in Elementary Education. Teaching elementary school was an honor and a pleasure for her. During that time, she was initiated into The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International DKG Upsilon Chapter on November 1, 1973. The Society and its members were an important part of Nadine's In 1983, she became Alpha Beta State President. She continued to serve the Society, and in 1994, she accepted the position as the Alpha Beta State Executive Secretary until her heart attack in 2005. Nadine served on various committees as Executive Secretary and was an original member at the beginning of the Leadership Development Committee, which formed in 1997 under the direction of Jean Gray. She continued to serve on committees,

most notably, the Finance Committee and the Bylaws and Standing Rules Committee. At the time of her death, she was again on the Bylaws Committee as chair.

Nadine attended the Leadership Development Class at Baylor University in WACO, Texas, sponsored by the Golden Gift Committee of Delta Kappa Gamma. She was also a member of the National Association of Parliamentarians.

Nadine was the voice of knowledge about the Society and our State Organization as we prepared conferences, conventions, and committee work. She attended International Conferences and Conventions, traveling with Jean Gray, until 2013. She attended her last International Convention in New York in 2012. Nadine was in attendance when Alpha Beta State hosted the Northeast Regional Conference in Baltimore.

None of this tells you the essence of Nadine. Nadine was a mentor and a stalwart friend. She wanted to help others to succeed and would nurture and guide. However, she did not GIVE answers. She helped you find them. She gave you her heart, her time, and her energy. Her goals also consisted of helping others and taking care of Jean. Nadine was proud of you when you succeeded and there to catch you if you were floundering. She was also very protective of those she loved. If there is one thing you will remember, it is that she wanted it done right. She was a stickler! Therefore, it is no wonder that Nadine was the consummate proofreader of the

newsletter, the Executive Board Minutes, and the Convention Minutes. She was often asked by committees to proofread their work and reports. I know I often asked her to proofread for me, and she wanted it formatted, formatted, formatted!!
