MAKE IT, TAKE IT!

Omega Chapter presented Make It, Take It with Purpose. Those in attendance at this workshop focused on the 7 purposes of Delta Kappa Gamma. Starting with the acronym IS SHE U I, they recorded which purpose matched each initial. Then definitions of each purpose were confirmed. Real life items were matched to each item to assist all with quickly recalling the 7 purposes. Working in pairs, sisters recorded chapter activities that matched each purpose. Finally, members were given golden bags to collect the real life items to take back to their chapter to share these reminders of the 7 Purposes of Delta Kappa Gamma.

Unite (rubber band)

Activities include: World Fellowship collection, sending cards to members who don't attend, having social events, meeting in schools, making personal calls to those not attending, driving members to meetings, attending state and international conventions, have lunch with Fullbright winners in your area and send birthday cards to our World Fellowship recipients.

Honor (rose)

Activities include: honoring members in newspaper, sending a note to your county's Teacher of the Year and finalists, Kudos in newsletters, presenting pins to 25 year plus members, giving sashes for achievement, sending cards to shut-ins, and sending notes for special recognitions.

Initiate (candle)

Activities include: supporting schools in Africa, Operation Christmas, awarding high school and college scholarships, inviting "topic of interest" presenters to meetings, Dress for Success, starting meetings with an inspirational message and encouraging members to apply for scholarships and mini-grants

Support (Life Saver)

Activities include: visiting Annapolis and White House, Girls from Gambia, supporting Lobby Day, giving items to a consignment shop to raise money for World Fellowship, and having speakers come talk about legislation

Endow (penny)

Activities include: giving scholarships, supporting African schools, Book Talks (giving a book to each member), endowing World Fellowship, and giving a grant to future educators.



Stimulate (Starburst)

Activities include: conducting fundraisers, having women's health speakers, health fair, having guest speakers on technology, and meeting during the summer and having a journal discussion.

Inform (DKG News)

Activities include: sharing historical information and explanations of DKG symbols, attending state and International activities, keeping up with legislation, using social media, having guest speakers and encouraging members to read and discuss journals.

<u>Dress For Success Project</u> <u>Theta Chapter</u>

Success means more than just "making it." Success also means getting community support to accomplish dreams and goals.

Delta Kappa Gamma gives community support to citizens who are economically disadvantaged in a meaningful way. Although citizens may have acquired the needed skills to gain employment, they may lack the business wardrobe to interview and actually go to work. A long-standing project in the Prince Georges County area is donations to The Training Source to assist local citizens gain employment.

Theta Chapter which is in its 5th year of partnering with the Training Source, gave a helping hand to community citizens by donating business clothing, shoes, toiletries, and even jewelry to assist trainees from The Training Source, Inc. This non-profit organization serving the Capital Heights community offers comprehensive training that helps participants obtain in-demand employment skills in cooperation with area employers. Theta Chapter is proud to be a partner in serving this community program which seeks to empower unemployed men and women who are entering the workforce by providing clothing and other accessories.

There was a great fellowship of Theta Sisters who came out in full force with wonderful items to donate to The Training Source. Literacy Project - Epsilon Chapter



For many years, Epsilon Chapter has designated the February meeting for a community service project. We have chosen the focus of literacy for this project.

Our chapter works with a book company to locate and purchase approximately 400 heavy duty board books that are appropriate for Pre-K 4 children. This year's books included topics such as shapes, colors, ABC's, and baby animals. At the work session during our meeting, members from each of our four counties assembled 100 bags of books. Each bag contains a book with a sticker identifying it as a gift from Epsilon Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma. We also included a sheet of tips for parents when reading with their child. In addition to the tips, this sheet identifies our organization and its purpose as well as sharing that members read the books in their child's classroom. We hope that the new addition of the "reading tips" sheet this year will help increase the enjoyment of the books when the children bring them home. Some years we also made and included an interactive puppet to use with the book. Members from each of our four counties contact schools to find a good time to visit, read, and distribute the books to the students. We can provide books to approximately 20 classes of Pre-K 4 classes each year. A fun time is had by all on those reading days. The children are thrilled when they realize they actually get to keep the books.

In addition to the community service project, at this meeting our members donate books they have enjoyed reading, but no longer need to keep. We have a chapter book exchange. Everyone enjoys going home with a "new" stack of books to read.

Finally, each member is given a paper labeled "Books I Want to Read" on which to record information on titles one may wish to read in the future. As we enjoy a delicious lunch together, members take time to share the title, author, and a brief description of a favorite book read recently.

The program not only helps with the literacy of children, but it helps to increase our own literacy through the book exchange and recommendation of books we have enjoyed.

Liiri Oja, World Fellowship Grant Recipient

Liiri Oja, a recipient of a Delta Kappa Gamma World Fellowship grant, attended our December Delta Chapter meeting. She wrote the following to help us get acquainted with her accomplishments and goals.

"As to my background - I'm from Estonia and this is where I have lived most of my life. I have a Law degree from Estonia and a Master's degree in international law from Oslo University, Norway. I finished that in December 2011, and then I worked at the Estonian Parliament as a legal advisor in the legal research department.

At Georgetown I'm also pursuing a Master's degree, but it is quite different from my European experience - studying at Georgetown is much more interactive and I can take very specific subjects like "Women's rights" and "Civil society law". I'm also doing US Constitutional law this semester that has been different and challenging (USA has common law, Estonia civil law system), but very interesting. As I'm also fond of teaching, I will be doing the Global Teaching Fellows program in January. We're preparing already now, and the idea is that international students help to teach 1st year JD students some international law through a week-long program. I'm very excited about this. I have years of experience in teaching debate and argumentation to highschool students and I've also done some Teaching Assistant work with my old university in Estonia.

My degree program at Georgetown finishes the end of May 2013. In the future I would like to continue with a PhD, and teach in a law school. Ideally not full-time as I would like to also practice law because I believe that actual practical experience would make me a better teacher.

Furthermore, my time in DC and at Georgetown so far has been nothing but amazing. I've met very interesting people, attended lectures given by Harold Koh and Kofi Annan, stood in line for 6 hours to see an oral hearing at the Supreme Court etc. And next Friday, on the 7th of December we're having a bake sale fundraiser at Georgetown to collect money for students from DC public school. "
